

### Dear Friends and Supporters of Casa de Esperanza,

Lori and I have had many people approach us recently regarding the continuing involvement of Case de Esperanza in Honduras, basically in relation to our age and energy levels. As we have talked about it, both personally and as a Board of Directors, it is a very complicated topic.

Casa de Esperanza has a history of leading many successful programs and we currently have multiple students working hard and ready for the next step in their lives. However, we recognize that planning for the future is certainly a wise venture at this time.



I recently had some time by myself in Honduras to assess each program that we support, with the goal of defining what role we are playing and if the programs we are supporting are currently successful and cost-effective. I was able to have many discussions (with the help of interpreters!) with the key people in our ministries. This was a trip that we owed to you, our supporters, as you have trusted us in the wise use of your gifts. Since the onset of our ministry, transparency and stewardship have been very important to us.

Proving this trust has been easy for us, as many of you have traveled with us on a group trip to Honduras and witnessed first hand our involvement in people's lives. Many of you have:



- Experienced a winding drive up a rutted mountain road and rapidly staffed a dental clinic (and packed up quickly if we found out that rain was coming)!
- Worked as a team to quickly learn your tasks in serving people with different dental and medical needs.
- Worked at an energy level that you didn't think you had, on a construction
  project that you knew would make a difference in people's lives a school,
  church, house, etc.
- Made new friends and worshipped with them in a different style than you were used to.
- Loved and supported people of a culture different than your own.

# CASA DE ESPERANZA FAQ

### Q: What are your monthly expenditures?

A: We have a set monthly budget that covers our basic expenditures. The breakdown is:

\$2500/month Comayagua Boy's Project

\$1000/month University Students

\$1600/month Honduran Employee Salaries

\$350/month Bilingual School Tuition

Total: \$5450/month

Every month we are presented with requests for funds. If it is determined to be a valid and urgent request, Lori often sends out emails for pop-up fundraisers to cover these expenses. These requests could vary from the need for a laptop computer, a medical bill, car repair, etc. They are unbudgeted needs that often we do not have funds for. Thank you for your purchases in this area, as not only did you get some good food, but you also helped out with an urgent situation. We also have several large expenditures each year, such as school start-up costs, vehicle insurance and registration, professional fees, etc. There is rarely a month where we have extra money that we do not know what to do with!



# "CASA FAQ" CONTINUED...

### Q: How are your funds generated?

**A:** By a LOT of hard work! Many of you have helped with catering events, the Coast Guard Festival, etc. We also send out newsletters and have some awesome churches that have placed us on their mission budget. If you have a suggestion for a fundraiser for us, or a church, person, or organization that like to see their donations make a huge difference, please let us know.



### Q: How much of my donation actually ends up in Honduras?

**A:** We have calculated this number multiple times and we can proudly say that 97% of donated funds always end up in Honduras. The remaining 3% are for expenditures like office supplies, accounting fees, etc. Our Board Members serve on a volunteer basis.

### Q: After Casa de Esperanza has supported a student, what professions are they in?

**A:** Electricians, Social Workers, Psychologists, Sales, Airplane Mechanic, Welders, Carpenters, Computer Systems Engineers, and Nurses – a wide variety of respected professions!



### Q: What is the success rate for your programs?

**A:** Our success rate is based on the graduation percentage of our students, which is 85%. This is an outstanding number, as many students come to us with poor schooling backgrounds and family situations. Once a student graduates and gets a job, they can assist their family, and the family income can triple. For example, when one of our students started our program, his family home had branches for the walls and ceiling with blue plastic between them. Now, the walls are concrete and the roof is corrugated metal.

# **VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT: NANCY NAGTZAAM**

18 years, serving as a founding Board Member and Dental Clinic
Organizer and Lead Hygienist. She has been active in fundraising, with
avid encouragement for the projects that we support. When the
Comayagua Boys Project was under consideration, our accounts were at
a minimum.

Nancy was behind this project 100%, and both pledged the start-up costs for this program and offered to help with fundraising activities to raise the monthly payment that was needed. Over the years, Nancy traveled over 20 times to Honduras. Because of Nancy's encouragement, many lives have been changed!!! **Nancy—we salute you!!!** 







# Q AND A WITH ADA AND CHEMA ALCERRO (DIRECTORS OF THE BOYS HOME) AND LUIS CASTILLO (WOOD AND METAL SHOP DIRECTOR)

### Q: What do you like about your job?

**A: Luis Castillo**—the eagerness shown by the boys to learn. It's like a math problem where steps are planned out to get to the correct solution. What we do in the shop is even better as the boys are producing good results that they are proud of. I am also encouraged by the boys when I witness the teamwork and fun that they have when we work on a project.

**A:** Ada and Chema Alcerro—we enjoy motivating the boys in schoolwork, broadening their faith, and having them feel loved in a family situation. We like to treat the boys as equals to us. We are always proud of their accomplishments, especially when, after they graduate, they start to support their families.

### Q: What are your dislikes? What challenges do you face?

**A: Luis Castillo**—cell phones and television get in the way of learning. Sometimes the boys need help planning their schedules as they are so busy.

**A:** Ada and Chema Alcerro—It is difficult to acclimate a new boy to our program. Once they are adapted to the routine, things go very well.

### Q: What are your goals for the upcoming year?

**A: Luis Castillo**—we strive to produce professional-looking and functional items that can be sold. The boys can be proud of their accomplishments and also receive money from the sale. Safety with the power tools is always a must and the boys wear appropriate goggles and use the tools wisely.

**A: Ada and Chema Alcerro**—we would like to see the boys take more leadership roles in their groups at the church. We continue to work with them on life principles and we encourage the older boys to be good mentors for the younger ones.
